CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Barnes called the June 8, 2026 Regular meeting of Florence City Council to order at 1:02 p.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Barnes gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation

ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Without objection, the agenda for the June 8, 2026 Regular meeting was adopted.



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APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to adopt the minutes of the April 30, 2026 Budget Work Session and Councilman McKay seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously (7-0) adopted.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to adopt the minutes of the May 11, 2026 Regular Meeting and Councilman McKay seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously (7-0) adopted.

SERVICE RECOGNITIONS

Mr. Adam Swindler, Director of Public Works, recognized Tracey Singletary for 10 years of service with the City of Florence.

GRANT PRESENTATION

The Duke Energy Foundation Grant – Presented by Mindy Taylor, Director of Government and Community Relations, Duke Energy

Mrs. Mindy Taylor, Director of Government and Community Relations, presented the City of Florence with a \$15,000 HERO (Helping Emergency Response Organizations) Grant from the Duke Energy Foundation. Mrs. Taylor noted that the grant program supports emergency response organizations because of the critical services they provide to their communities. The Duke Energy Foundation has committed \$500,000 to emergency response organizations across South Carolina. This marks the fifth consecutive year that the City of Florence has received a HERO Grant. This year's funding will benefit the Florence Fire Department, helping to purchase battery-operated equipment and air-monitoring devices that will enhance the department's emergency response capabilities.

PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing will be held to receive input on the City of Florence Fiscal Year budget 2026-2027.

Mayor Barnes opened the public hearing at 1:12pm.

Ms. Suzanne La Rochelle urged Council to prioritize the needs of Florence's most underserved residents in the budget and adopt a formal budget equity analysis tool before the next fiscal year. She said the budget does not clearly demonstrate whether City investments align with community needs and expressed concern that Community Program Funding totals only \$477,000. While acknowledging that not all budget funds are discretionary, she said residents most impacted by underfunded programs often have the fewest alternatives. Ms. La Rochelle also questioned the equal allocation of community funding among Councilmembers, emphasizing that equal distribution does not always result in equitable outcomes. She noted that other municipalities have implemented budget equity analysis tools and encouraged Council to do the same.

Mayor Barnes closed the public hearing at 1:17 p.m.

Mr. Glenn Bodenheimer, Finance Director, said the South Carolina Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office determined the City's allowable millage increase using the Consumer Price Index (2.63%) and population growth factor (0.74%). Including carryback millage, the City is permitted to increase operating millage by up to 3.4 mills; however, no operating millage increase is proposed for Fiscal Year 2026-2027. Debt service millage, which is not subject to statutory limitations, will remain at 4 mills. Mr. Bodenheimer also



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noted a proposed increase of \$0.75 per Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) for the Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund, the first adjustment since 2021. The increase equates to approximately \$9 annually per household and is necessary to maintain the self-supporting fund, which provides drainage maintenance, repairs, flood mitigation, and other citywide stormwater services. The proposed FY 2026-2027 budget totals \$157,995,410.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked Mr. Scotty Davis, City Manager, to discuss community programs and funding levels in response to Ms. La Rochelle's comments. Mr. Davis said the City's General Fund totals \$56,189,480 and supports essential services, including Fire, Police, Sanitation, Public Works, Parks, Recreation and Tourism, and administrative offices. He noted that approximately 60% to 70% of General Fund revenues are allocated toward employee salaries and benefits. Mr. Davis said the City has designated \$477,500 for community programs serving residents in need, including \$400,000 for Building Florence Together, the City's nonprofit organization established approximately three years ago. He also noted that, as a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) community, the City has budgeted \$352,512 in CDBG funding and approximately \$800,000 for programs that assist target area neighborhoods through housing initiatives, trash collection, property demolition, and rehabilitation efforts.

Mayor Barnes clarified that the programs identified by Mr. Davis directly benefit and support the community and asked him to restate the funding amounts, which he did.

Councilman McKay asked whether the process for community programs funded through the budget could be made public. Mr. Davis said it would be more appropriate to address that request during consideration of the budget's second reading.

Councilman Braddock asked Mr. Davis to explain the limitations of enterprise funds. Mr. Davis said that, aside from the \$56,189,480 General Fund, the remaining funds in the budget are enterprise funds that are legally restricted to specific purposes and cannot be used for projects or expenses outside of those designated purposes. Councilman Braddock reiterated that the City could not use enterprise fund revenues for unrelated projects, and Mr. Davis confirmed.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked whether City staff could explore the use of a budget equity analysis tool for the next budget cycle. Mr. Davis said yes.

Councilman Braddock asked that staff also research the cost of implementing such an analysis and provide that information to Council at a later date to determine its feasibility. Mr. Davis agreed and said it is always the City's mission and intent to provide services to residents in need. He said the City addresses issues regardless of where they occur and noted that Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding is intended to enhance, not replace, the services the City already provides. He emphasized that core services, including Fire, Police, and Sanitation, must be funded first.

Councilman Braddock asked for clarification on whether CDBG funding has significantly declined over the past 10 years. Mr. Davis confirmed that it has and said there have been discussions at the federal level over the years regarding the potential elimination of CDBG funding.

Mayor Barnes expressed support for Council's community-driven approach and highlighted the work accomplished throughout the community during the current Council's tenure. She said that while Council would like to do more, funding limitations exist, but their commitment to serving the community remains strong.



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ORDINANCES IN POSITION

Bill No. 2026-18 – Second Reading

An Ordinance to amend the budget for the City of Florence, SC for Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026.

Pro tem Jebailly made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-18 on second reading and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-18 was adopted.

Bill No. 2026-19 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to raise revenue and adopt a budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2026 and ending June 30, 2027.

Pro tem Jebailly made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-19 on second reading and Councilman McCall seconded the motion.

Councilman McKay suggested including the budgeted allocations for Community Program Funding in the budget materials to provide greater transparency.

Pro tem Jebailly agreed that increased transparency is beneficial but said delaying budget adoption to incorporate the information would not be advisable given the approaching end of the fiscal year. He suggested addressing the matter during the next budget cycle or at a future meeting and noted that Council could meet with the City Manager to discuss the process further. Councilman McKay clarified that he was not seeking to delay adoption of the budget but simply wanted the information included for transparency purposes.

Mr. Ron Scott, City Attorney, said the budget adoption process already involves Council's deliberation and discussion of funding allocations. He said incorporating a detailed breakdown of these specific allocations into the budget ordinance would be procedurally difficult and recommended that, if Council desires additional explanation, it could be addressed during future budget workshops.

Councilman McKay clarified that he was referring to the spreadsheet and grading process Council used during its budget discussions. Councilman Braddock agreed that transparency is important and suggested publicly releasing the community program allocations and how the funding decisions were made by Council.

Mayor Barnes said Council could approve the budget and also release the community program allocations for transparency purposes but asked how the two matters could be handled separately. Mr. Ron Scott, City Attorney, said the budget ordinance is a stand-alone matter and noted that previous Executive Session discussions involving contractual matters and outside funding agencies made it difficult to establish a standard for releasing individual Councilmember feedback related to funding decisions.

Councilman Smith asked whether community program funding has increased each year, and Mr. Scotty Davis, City Manager, confirmed that it has. Councilman Smith also asked whether increasing community program funding was discussed during development of the current budget, and Mr. Davis confirmed that it was.

Mr. Scott said it would be most appropriate to address the release of community program allocations at the next meeting since the matter was not included on the current agenda and would not affect approval of



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the budget. He added that, if desired, Council could direct staff to prepare a report outlining the process used to determine community program funding allocations.

Councilman Braddock emphasized the importance of transparency and asked whether there was an opportunity on the current agenda to release the community program funding documentation. He expressed concern that delaying the matter could create the perception that Council was not being transparent.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked whether the City Manager could simply release the information.

Mayor Barnes said Council should proceed with approving the budget and discuss how to move forward with releasing the community program allocations during Executive Session.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-19 was adopted.

Following Executive Session, Council returned to open session. Councilman Smith then made a motion to reconsider the vote taken earlier to adopt Bill No. 2026-19 and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion. Councilman Smith said the reason for reconsidering the vote is due to Council receiving information regarding state legislative updates.

Pro tem Jebaily asked for clarification that, if the motion to reconsider was approved, Council would then have an opportunity to make a motion to amend. Mr. Ron Scott, City Attorney, said that if the motion to reconsider passes, Council would return to the point at which the original motion and second were pending, allowing an amendment to be proposed. Pro tem Jebaily further asked whether any proposed amendment would need to be stated at that time, and Mr. Scott confirmed.

Councilman McCall asked whether there would be a final vote on the budget after the amendment was considered. Mr. Scott said yes and explained that, if an amendment is adopted, Council would then vote on the ordinance as amended.

Council voted 6-1, with Pro tem Jebaily voting against the motion to reconsider. The motion to reconsider was passed.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to amend Bill No. 2026-19 by reducing the Florence Regional Airport allocation by \$80,000 and reallocating those funds to the Pee Dee Regional Transportation Authority (PDRTA), increasing PDRTA's allocation from \$281,000 to \$361,000 and Councilman McKay seconded the motion.

Pro tem Jebaily said he supports increased funding for PDRTA but does not believe reducing funding for the Florence Regional Airport is in the community's best interest. He noted that both organizations play important roles in economic development and expressed opposition to amending the approved budget.

Councilman Braddock said he agreed with Pro tem Jebaily's concerns but noted that legislative information provided to Council indicated the airport would receive state funding. He said that, based on that information, the state would help bridge the funding gap, allowing the City to direct additional resources toward local needs.

Council voted 6-1, with Pro tem Jebaily voting against the motion to amend.

The motion to amend was passed.



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Councilman Braddock made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-19 on second reading and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion.

Council voted (6-1) in favor of the motion, with Pro tem Jebaily voting against the motion. Bill No. 2026-19 was adopted, as amended.

Bill No. 2026-20 – Second Reading

An Ordinance to rezone the property located on Stokes Road from CG to RG-3, identified as Florence County Tax Map Number 00121-01-065.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-20 on second reading and Councilman McKay seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-20 was adopted.

Bill No. 2026-21 – Second Reading

An Ordinance to annex and zone PD the 0.13 acre lot adjacent to 1057 Grove Boulevard, identified as Florence County Tax Map Number 07515-01-301.

Councilman McKay made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-21 on second reading and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-21 was adopted.

Bill No. 2026-22 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to declare as surplus and authorize the conveyance of the real estate known as Tax Parcel 00121-01-029 to the Florence Section National Council of Negro Women, described more fully on Exhibit "A" attached hereto.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-22 on second reading and Pro tem Jebaily seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-22 was adopted.

Bill No. 2026-23 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to declare as surplus and authorize the conveyance of the real estate known as Tax Parcel 90066-06-008 to John and Candace Greenan, described more fully on Exhibit "A" attached hereto.

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-23 on second reading and Councilman McCall seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-23 was adopted.

Bill No. 2026-24 - Second Reading

A Series Ordinance authorizing water and sewer system revenue borrowing and approval of State Revolving Fund loan for infrastructure improvements, and other matters related thereto.

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2026-24 on second reading and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion.



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Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-24 was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

Bill No. 2026-17 – First Reading

An Ordinance to approve a lease extension of property known as 314 W. Pine Street and designated as Florence County Tax Map Number 90075-04-020 to Pee Dee Healthy Start, Inc.

Mayor Barnes said this item may be discussed in Executive Session.

Without objection, this item will be discussed in Executive Session.

Bill No. 2026-25 - First Reading

An Ordinance to rezone the parcel located at 901 Rose Street from NC-6.1 to NC-6.2, identified as Florence County Tax Map Number 90114-13-004.

Councilman Smith made a motion to pass Bill No. 2026-25 on first reading and Councilman McKay seconded the motion.

Mr. Jerry Dudley, Director of Planning, said this property is located at the corner of Maxwell Street and Rose Street near Dr. Iola Jones Park. The request is to rezone the property from Neighborhood Conservation 6.1 (NC-6.1), which permits small-lot single-family detached homes, to Neighborhood Conservation 6.2 (NC-6.2), which permits both single-family detached homes and attached housing, including duplexes. Mr. Dudley noted that the surrounding area includes both NC-6.1 and NC-6.2 zoning districts and due to the roadway, the property would be contiguous with the existing NC-6.2 zoning designation.

Pro tem Jebailly inquired about the surrounding properties and confirmed that a commercial property is adjacent to the site, while the surrounding area consists primarily of single-family homes located within the City limits. Mr. Dudley explained that the proposed development would remain single-family in nature, consisting of attached single-family units, with duplexes representing the highest density permitted.

Councilman Smith asked about the recommendation of Planning Commission. Mr. Dudley reported that Planning Commission voted unanimously (4-0) to recommend approval of the zoning request following discussion and a presentation by the property owner/developer. He noted that the developer, a local resident who grew up in the area, intends to construct duplex rental units. Mr. Dudley added that both the Housing Study and the Comprehensive Plan support the development and identified additional single-family housing as a community need.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked whether the developer had presented plans depicting the appearance of the duplexes. Mr. Dudley stated that such plans are not required at this stage of the process but noted that any future development plans would be required to comply with the City's design guidelines.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-25 was passed on first reading.



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INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 2026-31

A Resolution to proclaim the month of June as Homeownership Month in the City of Florence.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to pass Resolution No. 2026-31 and Councilman McKay seconded the motion.

Mayor Barnes presented the Resolution to Ms. Vonda Sellers-Ford, President of Pee Dee Realtors Association. Ms. Sellers-Ford thanked Council for the recognition.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Resolution No. 2026-31 was passed.

REPORT TO COUNCIL

Appointments to Boards and Commissions

Mayor Barnes said this item may be discussed in Executive Session. Without objection, this item will be discussed in Executive Session.

Utilities Update

Mr. Michael Hemingway, Director of Utility Planning and Economic Development, introduced Mrs. Amanda Pope, Director of Marketing, Communications and Municipal Services, to provide an update on the City's communications efforts related to utilities.

Mrs. Pope announced the launch of the City's new utilities branding initiative, Resilient Infrastructure and System Enhancements (RISE), guided by the principles of Investing Today, Building Tomorrow, and Serving Our Community. She said the initiative reflects the City's commitment to moving beyond past challenges, rebuilding trust through action, and demonstrating accountability, progress, and continuous improvement in delivering utility services. Mrs. Pope explained that the RISE logo uses blue to represent water, light green to represent sewer, and dark green to represent stormwater, creating a consistent visual identity for utility projects. She also noted that project names on informational materials align with those displayed on the utility portals to maintain consistency.

Pro tem Jebailly expressed his support for the RISE initiative and commended staff for their efforts in developing the program. Councilman Braddock and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson also expressed their support, with Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson noting that the initiative demonstrates to the public the City's commitment to addressing utility system needs.

Mr. Scotty Davis, City Manager, also commended Mrs. Pope for her leadership in developing the initiative and said additional information and resources would continue to be rolled out.

Mrs. Pope then demonstrated the updated Utilities webpage and utility portals, noting that AECOM assisted staff in creating a more user-friendly and customer-focused platform. She said the City's communication efforts also include press releases, social media outreach, and educational campaigns highlighting the City's water sources and utility resources. She added that Utility staff would participate in the June 20th Bee City Market Takeover and continue engaging with residents throughout the community.



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Councilman McCall asked how residents can access the utility portals. Mrs. Pope said a RISE Utilities tab is located on the homepage of the City's website and directs users to the RISE webpage.

Pro tem Jebailly referenced a press release announcing that the section of Coit Street between Cherokee Road and Timrod Park would be closed beginning Monday, June 15, for approximately three weeks due to an upcoming project.

Mr. Hemingway reported that the City currently has 31 active utility projects, including 12 water projects, eight sewer projects, seven stormwater projects, and four utility crossover projects. He said these projects involve collaboration among City staff and consulting firms AECOM, CDM Smith, and Ardurra throughout the design, permitting, and construction phases. Mr. Hemingway also announced that a public meeting regarding the Jeffries Creek Sanitary Sewer Project Phase I would be held this evening from 5:30 pm to 7:00pm in Council Chambers, with representatives from CDM Smith available to provide information and answer questions about the project.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Scotty Davis, City Manager, shared a promotional video for the Fireworks Over Florence event scheduled for July 4th. He also announced that the City of Florence was recently ranked by the U.S. News & World Report as the third-best place to live in South Carolina for 2026-2027, marking the second consecutive year the City has received this recognition.

Mr. Davis said the City works with Capital Hill Consulting Group, a bipartisan lobbying firm based in Washington, D.C., and its grant-writing affiliate, Capital Funding Solutions of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to pursue federal funding opportunities. He provided an overview of accomplishments over the past year, including an invitation to apply for a \$193 million Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) loan through the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), a SAFER grant application through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to fund 15 additional firefighters over a three-year period, and efforts to resubmit a grant application for an intermodal transportation center in partnership with PDRTA. Mr. Davis also highlighted several funding successes, including \$5 million in congressionally directed spending for the Pine Street Groundwater Treatment Plant, \$2.25 million in appropriations for water and sewer projects secured through Congressman Fry's office, a \$40 million authorization through the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) with assistance from Congressman Fry and Senator Lindsey Graham, a \$65 million WRDA authorization through Senator Graham, and \$11.2 million in congressionally directed spending through the United States Army Corps of Engineers for water infrastructure improvements. He noted that the City was not selected for a \$9.66 million grant that had been advanced by Senator Graham's office and continues to pursue additional funding opportunities.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson asked for clarification on the funding secured during the past year. Mr. Davis said the City has secured \$5 million, plus an additional \$2.25 million, in federal funding.

MAYORAL REPORT

Mayor Barnes expressed her gratitude for the outpouring of love and support shown to her and her family during their time of bereavement. She noted that every City department includes community-focused initiatives in its budget and highlighted the City's ongoing efforts to support and engage the community. Mayor Barnes also thanked City staff for their dedication and commitment to serving residents.



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COMMITTEE REPORTS

Business Development Committee, Chaired by Pro tem Jebaily

Pro tem Jebaily reported that the committee met at the AESC Training Center and reviewed several ongoing projects and infrastructure initiatives. The committee discussed Project Urban Square, with Pro tem Jebaily noting the construction currently underway. The committee also reviewed the MUSC and McLeod Health water tank projects, the Railroad Crossing Elimination Grant, and various South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) projects. In addition, the committee received updates on general utility capital infrastructure projects, AESC, the Florence East Industry project, the GE Groundwater Treatment Plant, and federal funding opportunities. Pro tem Jebaily also highlighted the city's Water Quality Master Plan.

Community Development Committee, Chaired by Mayor Barnes

Mayor Barnes reported that the committee discussed an initiative to bring local nonprofit organizations together to strengthen collaboration and better serve community members who lack access to connections, resources, and awareness of available services. The committee also received updates regarding Building Florence Together, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) projects, and various other community service-related projects.

Finance, Audit and Budget Committee, Chaired by Councilman McCall

Councilman McCall reported that the committee discussed the City's procurement process, including efforts to prioritize local vendors whenever possible. The committee also entered Executive Session to discuss contractual matters.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Barnes said Council will be entering into Executive Session for a discussion and receipt of legal advice regarding proposed contractual arrangement for the lease of property as referenced in Bill No. 2026-17, for a discussion regarding appointments to city Boards and Commissions, to receive legal advice regarding potential election changes and to receive an update regarding Project Urban Square.

Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson made a motion to enter into Executive Session and Councilman McCall seconded the motion. Council voted unanimously (7-0) to enter into Executive Session at 2:21pm.

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to resume open session and Councilwoman NeSmith-Jackson seconded the motion. The motion carried. Council resumed open session at 3:52pm and took action on the following items:

Bill No. 2026-17 – First Reading

An Ordinance authorizing the execution of an amendment to extend the Lease Agreement between the City of Florence and Pee Dee Healthy Start, Inc.

Councilman Smith made a motion to defer Bill No. 2026-17 and Councilman McKay seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) in favor of the motion. Bill No. 2026-17 was deferred.



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Appointments to Boards and Commissions

Mr. Davis presented the packet of appointments to Boards and Commissions to Council.

Resilience and Sustainability Advisory Committee

Councilman McKay deferred his nomination to the Board.

Design Review Board

Councilman McCall deferred his nomination to the Board.

Construction and Maintenance Board of Adjustments and Appeals

Mayor Barnes deferred remaining nominations to the Board.
